Kids in the Kitchen

Pumpkin patch pudding cups are the perfect treat for fall.

Ingredients

- ✓ Clear plastic cups
- ✓ Chocolate pudding
- ✓ Chocolate cream cookies
- ✓ Green sugar crystal sprinkles
- ✓ Mellowcreme pumpkins
- ✓ Paper straw (1 each sign)
- ✓ Craft sticks (5 each sign)
- ✓ Paint or paint pen
- ✓ Optional: green gel, fall leaf sprinkles



- 1. Prepare chocolate pudding and fill the plastic cups about 3/4 full.
- 2. Crush up a few chocolate cream cookies.
- Sprinkle cookie crumbs onto the top of the pumpkin patch pudding. This will be the "dirt."
- 4. Add green sprinkles around the top of your pumpkin patch pudding cup. This will be the "grass."
- Place a few mellowcreme pumpkins on the top of your pudding and push them down gently into the "dirt."
- 6. Add green gel for vines and sprinkle on leaf-shaped sprinkles if you wish!
- 7. Put the pudding cups in the refrigerator to set.
- 8. Make the pumpkin patch signs by gluing the craft sticks onto the paper straw. Make sure the sticks are centered and that they each touch. Leave a small amount of the straw poking out from the top and a good amount below to stick in the pudding.
- 9. Using the paint or paint pen, write "Pumpkins \$1.00" onto the sign. Let the sign dry.
- 10. Once the pumpkin patch pudding has set, carefully stick the sign in near the back. If needed, place the pudding cup back into the refrigerator for a bit so the sign does not fall over.
- 11. Serve chilled and enjoy!

Did you know that shells have been used as a form of currency?

There have been many unusual forms of money throughout history. The cowry, which is the shell of a sea snail, was the longest and most widely used currency in history. These shells are colorful and durable, which made them popular money with civilizations around the world. Cowry shells were used as a method of payment from 1300 BC until the 20th century!

Decoding the Dollar Bill

Have you ever wondered what all the symbols and images on a dollar bill represent? Here is your guide to the mystery behind the money. Take out a dollar bill and follow along!

• Portrait:

George Washington, America's first president, takes center stage on the one-dollar bill. The portrait comes from a painting created by artist Gilbert Stuart in 1796.

• Circular Seal with Letter:

The letter located to the left of George Washington indicates the Federal Reserve Bank that ordered the bill. What letter is on your dollar bill?

A=Boston, B=New York City, C=Philadelphia, D=Cleveland, E=Richmond, F=Atlanta, G=Chicago, H=St. Louis, I=Minneapolis, J=Kansas City, K=Dallas, L=San Francisco

• Treasury Seal:

The seal to the right of George Washington contains an image of balancing scales, which symbolize justice, and a key, which symbolizes authority.

• Pyramid:

This image on the back of the bill is meant to represent strength.

Fun fact: The pyramid has 13 steps in honor of the original 13 colonies.

• Bald Eagle:

The nation's bird holds arrows in its left talon and an olive branch in its right, which are meant to signify war and peace.
